

Making the Final Decision

This lesson is designed to highlight the key steps of making the final college decision.

OBJECTIVES

Students will:

1. Learn about different types of financial aid to help comprehend financial aid offers
2. Utilize MEFA Pathway's *College Cost Calculator* and *Loan Cost Estimator* to calculate a personalized cost at each college they were accepted to

ACTIVITIES

PART 1

Content Knowledge

Pre-class activity

Students should watch MEFA's [After the College Acceptance webinar](#). Students should take notes on terminology that is new to them and information they find useful, taking into account their current college acceptance status. Students should also include any questions that they have after watching the webinar.

PART 2

Applying Information

Students should apply the knowledge they gathered from MEFA's *After the College Acceptance* webinar in a Kahoot game MEFA will provide that will cover the webinar content. Students can use the notes they took while watching the webinar during the game. They should also take additional notes during the game.

In-Class Instruction

1. Divide the class into small groups
2. Have one student from each group register for the game
3. Once the game starts, each team must decide on a final answer together. When providing their answer, groups must explain how they came to their decision.

Virtual Class Instruction

1. Review [How to host Kahoot! remotely](#) and follow the instructions
2. During the game, pause between questions to ask students about the thought process behind their answers and if they have additional questions.

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PART 3

Evaluating Information

Students should apply the information they have learned to review their financial aid offers. Students should enter the information from their offers into MEFA Pathway's *College Cost Calculator*. The costs of tuition & fees, room & board, and books & supplies for each school should be calculated and recorded in an Excel spreadsheet. After the students have calculated their personal cost at each college, they should use MEFA Pathway's *Loan Cost Estimator* if they are interested in borrowing a loan. Students should also add this to their Excel spreadsheet.

PART 4

Critical Thinking/Creative Application

Students should reflect on the college cost Excel spreadsheet they created and rank the schools from the most affordable to the least affordable. Students should research the top colleges they are considering by visiting each college's website to explore further. Students should consider factors such as programs/majors of interest, sports, clubs, graduation rate, retention rate, size and location, and options for online programs when assessing the best fit.
