

The Cost of College

This lesson is designed to help students discover the cost of different types of colleges by using the College Cost Calculator in order to compare a variety of college options.

OBJECTIVES

Students will:

1. Learn the difference between two-year/four-year colleges and private/public colleges
2. Connect their own interests to one two-year college and three four-year colleges: one private college, one public in-state college, and one public out-of-state college
3. Evaluate the cost of each of the colleges they chose
4. Create a poster detailing the differences in tuition & fees, room & board, and books & supplies for their chosen colleges, and reflect upon which they think will be the most financially feasible for them

ACTIVITIES

PART 1

Content Knowledge

Ask students to reflect in writing on the following prompt:

If there were no monetary limitations or admissions requirements to meet, what college would you want to go to and why?

Discuss student answers about their dream colleges to get the conversation going. Lead into the differences between two/four-year colleges and private/public colleges.

- Two-year college: an institution that offers undergraduate coursework for two years. Many programs are vocational and offer associate degrees or the equivalent of the freshman and sophomore years at a four-year undergraduate institution
- Four-year colleges/university: An institution that offers undergraduate curriculum that results in an academic degree known as a baccalaureate degree, or bachelor's degree
- Public colleges/university: A college or university that is predominantly funded through public means through a national or subnational government
- Private colleges/university: A college or university that is predominantly funded through private means. Many are operated as educational and research nonprofit organizations. Tuition and fees tend to be higher than at public universities.

Grade Level: 10 - 12

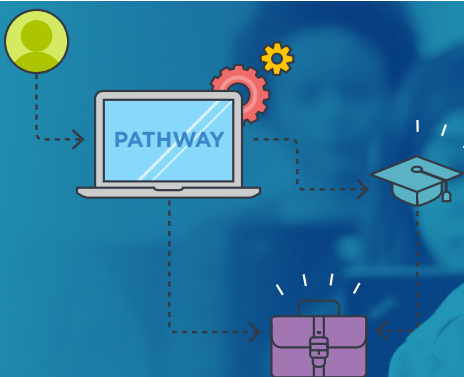

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LESSON PLAN

Lead into a discussion about the differences in cost for colleges that are in a student's home state versus outside of a student's home state. **Important:** Though this exercise will not explore financial aid options, explain to students that though a school may have a high cost, it may end up being the best financial option (and lowest cost school) based on the financial aid received.

PART 2

Applying Information

Knowing what they know about the different types of colleges, students should choose several colleges that they are interesting in learning more about. Students should choose one two-year school and three four-year schools: one private school, one public in-state school, and one public out-of-state school.

PART 3

Evaluating Information

Students will use the College Cost Calculator and their chosen schools to research the estimated costs of tuition & fees, room & board, and books & supplies for each school. Students should record this information as they will be using it to create a poster. In order to see the difference between in-state and out-of-state estimated tuition, students will need to use the College Compare page in addition to the College Cost Calculator.

PART 4

Critical Thinking/Creative Application

Students will create a poster that neatly displays the information that they've researched. They must include the school name, estimated costs of tuition & fees, room & board, and books & supplies for each school. They also must indicate what category or categories their schools fall into (two/four-year, public/private, and in/out-of-state). Additionally, students reflect on which of the schools (out of the ones they've researched) would be the most financially feasible for their future and thoroughly explain why.
